3. **Respect noise levels:** Noise can be annoying. You know it and so do I. Be thoughtful about noise coming from your unit. Remember to turn down the volume on your holiday music in the late evening and cut back on practicing your tap dance routine during the early morning hours.
4. **Plan for parking:** Plan ahead when it comes to parking. If you are hosting guests during the holidays, do your best to encourage your visitors to be thoughtful about our limited parking space (carpooling is nice) 'Tis the season to be a good neighbor!

Parkfairfax Holiday Decorations— Rules And Guidelines

Holiday decorations and lighting are permitted without the necessity of an application as long as they are tasteful and only during a holiday period as defined below, subject to such determination by management of the Covenants Committee. The following rules apply:

1. All decorative lighting **MUST** be turned off the day after a holiday period.
2. All decorations, including all lighting, must be removed from the exteriors of units, including doors, windows, brick walls, railings, and columns, and from the common element, including bushes and trees, within two weeks after the end of a holiday period.
3. The holiday periods are only December 1st through January 6th and October 1st through October 31st.
4. Decorations or lighting are permitted during holiday periods on doors, door frames, posts, columns, or exterior brick walls.
5. Care must be exercised during installation to avoid damage to any materials, including to any brick or woodwork.
6. Drilling of the brick is **NOT** allowed; proper, non-damaging attachment to the mortar joints is acceptable. Any and all damage will be the full responsibility of the unit owner to repair or replace.
7. Temporary lighting and decorations on and between shrubs and trees on common elements are permitted during holiday periods but must be completely removed within the timelines specified above. Due care is required in both installation and removal to prevent damage to the plant material.
8. Electric cords must not create trip hazards or impede use of Association sidewalks, or they will be removed by Parkfairfax at the unit owner's expense.
9. Decorations or lighting during holiday periods may extend onto the common element but only directly in front of the applicable unit. Communal decorations extending in front of other units may only be installed with the express written permission of all impacted residents and are subject to all of the above-listed restrictions.

October Board Meeting Highlights

- The Board APPROVED a Financial Management Contract with First Service Residential at an annual cost of \$95,000.
- The Board APPROVED the Ludowici terracotta tile as the roofing material for the Parkfairfax roofing program.
- The Board APPROVED authorizing Walker Consultants to redo the construction documents for a complete repair of the buildings 822 and 828 at an additional cost of \$85,000.
- The Board APPROVED the August 2025 Reserve Expenditures in the amount of \$132,654.69 with funds to come from GL 9901.015, Reserve Expenditures.

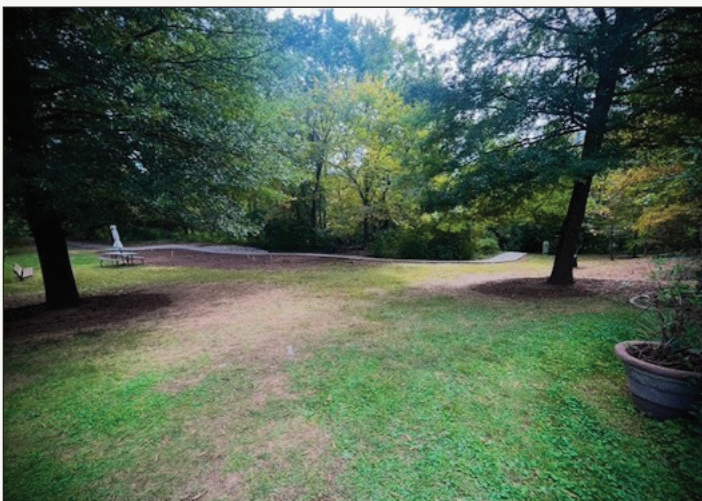
The Restoration of Tot Lot 7

Parking Policy Holiday Reminders

As guests come to visit for the holidays, please keep the Parking Policy rules in mind. Residents of Parkfairfax are entitled to use available common element parking spaces for approved vehicles, on a first-come first-served basis.



- Vehicles must be parked so as not to block access to the sidewalks.
- The Bylaws permit only one vehicle per unit to park on the common element parking spaces without the prior written consent of the Board of Directors. Common element parking includes all of the lanes and all the semi-circular off-street parking areas, along with the cul-de-sac at the Exercise Room, the parking lot at the Martha Custis swimming pool and the Valley Drive Tennis Courts parking area.
- No trailer, boat, or recreational vehicle (RV) may be parked in any common element parking area.
- State inspection stickers, current license plates, and current City Sticker must be properly displayed or shall not be kept on any of the common elements. Vehicles parked on Association property may not be covered in a way that obstructs the viewing of the license tags and registration sticker(s).
- All vehicles must be kept in proper operating condition so as not to be a hazard or a nuisance by noise, exhaust emission, or appearance. Management will post a 72-hour notice on a vehicle that is in violation of the Parking Policy Resolution. If vehicle is not removed or brought into compliance the vehicle will be towed (at owners' expense and risk). All towing will be on an on-call basis. Authorization and supervision will be done by Management and/or the President of the Board of Directors only.
- Driving or parking motorized vehicles of any kind on the common elements not designated for vehicle use (i.e. grass, sidewalks, or breezeways) is strictly prohibited. In addition to the towing provisions above, breaches, alleged or actual, of the above regulations are subject to appropriate action by the Covenants Committee, under the provisions of Policy Resolution Number Four.
- The Unit Owners Association or the Board are not responsible for damage to vehicles or loss of property from vehicles parked on the common elements.

What is your favorite game? "Find it!". My mom hides stuff and I use my super sniffer to track it down. I never lose. Ever.

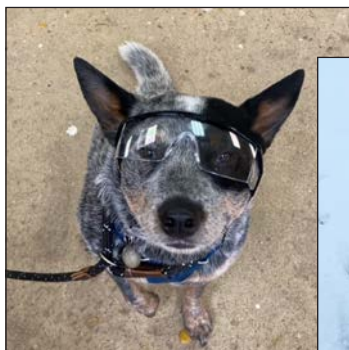

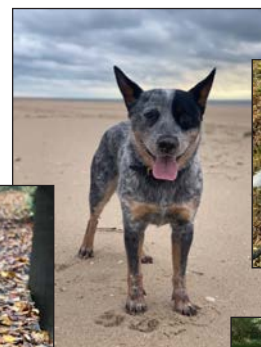

Nature In Our Neighborhood

"Meow, meow!" Hello neighbors! You may think you hear a cat meowing, but it's me —the gray catbird! I am a migratory bird. By time you read this, I am hopefully settled in my winter home in the tropics of Latin America. In the fall, I fly south to find the best food and shelter during your winter season. In the spring, I fly north to find the most food and the best place to breed and raise my young.

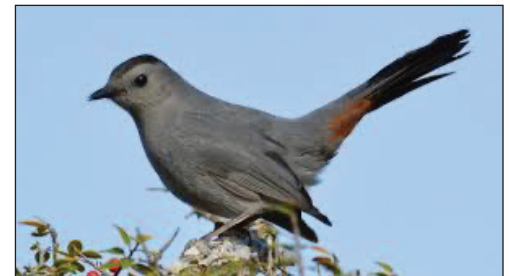
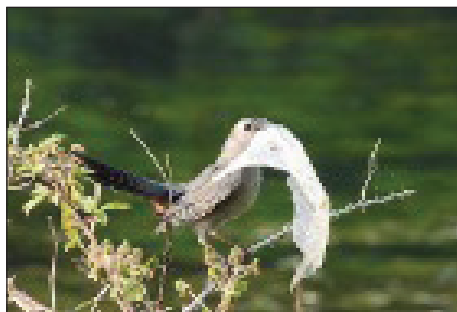
I am pleased and "preened" to tell you about myself. My scientific name is *Dumetella carolinensis*. I'm in the family *Mimidae* which includes the northern mockingbird and the brown thrasher. I mimic the sounds of other birds and use them to create my own songs.

I didn't leave Parkfairfax because of cold weather. On the contrary, I followed the flyway that led me to my food of scrumptious spiders, delectable insects, and juicy berries and fruits. Did you know I migrated at night and used the stars to find my way?

Although many of my bird brethren do not enjoy the hustle and bustle of human activity, I don't mind it, and during the spring and summer months, I will build my nest in shrubs and vines in your yards and local parks. I am curious and sometimes adorn my nest with litter you humans leave behind, such as plastic straw wrappers, string, and even bottle caps. (But please don't tempt me with litter! I hear that nestlings can get tangled in discarded debris. Oh my feathers!)

I came across many hazards along my migratory journey. And speaking on behalf of all migratory birds, you can help us during our annual migration seasons. It is simple to do!

1. Turn off unnecessary lights at night that disorient us.
2. Find out how you can make your windows safe, so we don't collide into them head first. Ouch!



3. Keep cat companions inside. Our fledglings do not yet understand the perils of felines.
4. Avoid using pesticides that eradicate the insects we need to eat to survive. Pesticides also make us very sick.
5. Grow plants that attract the insects we need to feed our young, such as delicious caterpillars. Speaking of which, I heard through the bird vine that Carolina chickadees feed their nestlings approximately 7000 caterpillars in a two-week time. Wow! That's record breaking!
6. If you leave water for us in a birdbath, it is very important to refill the water at least twice a week, and thoroughly clean the water once a week. We can become sick from fetid standing water where algae and debris harbor harmful bacteria, mold, and mosquito larvae. Yuk!
Hopefully, you will hear me again in the spring. Listen for my distinct meow calls and my melodious songs. Afterall, I can sing non-stop for ten minutes straight! What will I be singing? It will be a simple tune to discern: Thank you all for welcoming me back home!"

Pickleball IS a Big Dill!

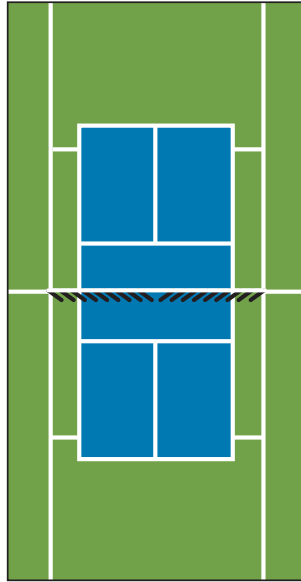

If you've heard the sound of paddles popping and laughter coming from Valley Drive, you've witnessed the fastest-growing sport in Parkfairfax (and most of America): Pickleball!

Why is it such a big dill?

Pickleball is a paddle sport that combines elements of tennis, badminton, and table tennis. It's played with a perforated plastic ball and solid paddles on a smaller court with a lower net than tennis. The rules are simple to learn, making it accessible for everyone from newcomers to experienced players. And it's a great way for residents of all ages to stay active and get to know their neighbors!

Fun Fact: A pickleball court is a little bit smaller than a Lincoln unit—under 900 square feet. If you play doubles, you probably won't need to leave your kitchen/dining room area!

In October, the Board of Directors had four new courts installed at the tennis courts behind the Martha Custis pool—which can be used for both tennis and pickleball. Like at Valley Drive, the pickleball lines have been painted in yellow over the existing white tennis court lines. The pickleball nets can be rolled in and out as needed.

Fun Terms: "I'm dinking it into the kitchen!" While it may sound like gobbledygook, it's a real thing. A "dink" is a soft, controlled shot that lands in the opponent's "kitchen," the non-volley zone on each side of the net. The phrase describes making a strategic shot that causes the ball to drop just over the net, making it difficult for the opponent to attack.

The Recreation Committee is planning to host pickleball sessions; please watch for announcements. But the courts are open now, so grab your paddle and have some fun!

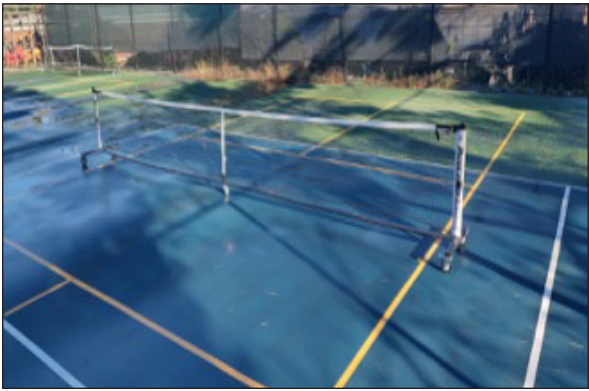

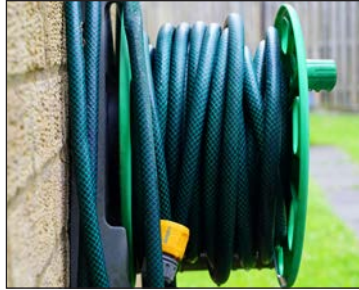

Snow Removal

The seasons first reminder; staff is responsible for clearing all common element walkways (walks that serve more than one unit). Each resident is responsible for clearing that portion of the walkways that serve only their unit. Residents who are unable to clear their own entry walks due to physical impairment may complete the "Request For Snow Removal Assistance" form and return it to the main office.

Please note that last years list will not be used. If you require this type of assistance again this year, you must submit a new form. We cannot make any exceptions.

- Please do not use the sand barrels as trash receptacles or "dog walk" containers (these will be placed near each Laundry Room in early November).
- Please do not park in the intersections or crosswalks during a storm. This stops our motorized equipment.
- Please do not "reserve" a parking space with furniture or boards. All parking lanes will be plowed once the cars are moved.
- Please do not ask staff to dig out or jump-start your car. This is not the maintenance staff's job and detracts from their scheduled work assignments.
- While digging out your car, please do not make huge piles on the streets or sidewalks. It does take extra time to put the shoveled snow onto the lawn areas. However, roads and walkways can become impassable, even to snow removal equipment, due to compacted piles of snow.
- Do not use household salt or rock salt on concrete or flagstone walks and steps. Never use any ice melting chemicals that contain ammonium nitrate or ammonium sulphate. Do not use any type of ice melting chemicals on newer walks—sand is fine.

The Association will have small baggies of ice melting chemicals available at the Main Office once we get into the winter weather. These are the same pink crystals that staff uses. This ice melt is sodium chloride based, but has been specially treated to protect concrete.

Please be patient during winter weather. Take your time and enjoy the season!

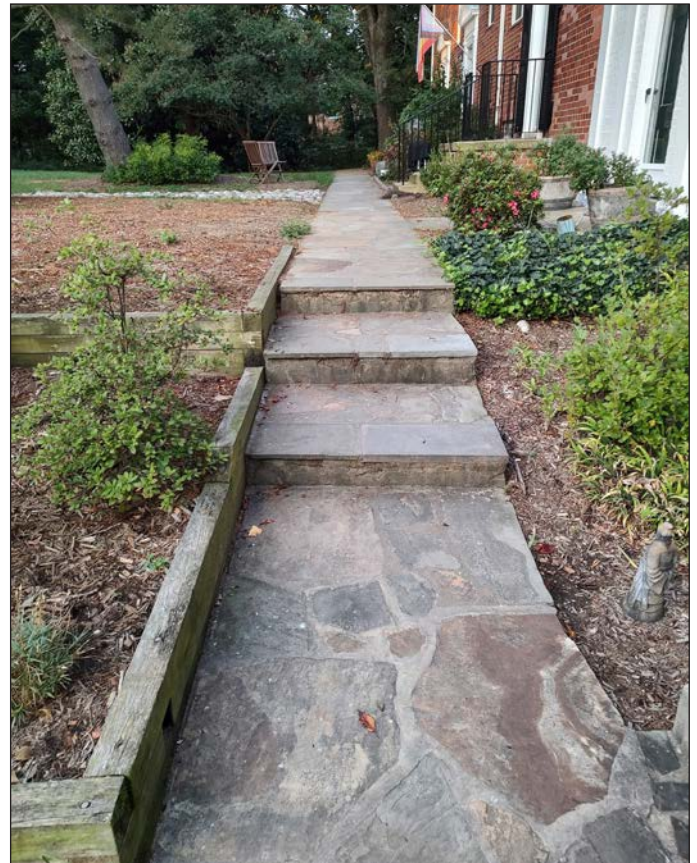

Please Keep Lights On at Night!

It is that time of year when the days get shorter and daylight savings time ends. It can get very dark in the neighborhood, especially if you are walking to units not bordering a streetlight.

Be a good neighbor and help keep our community safer by turning on your unit outside lights every night to keep

our surroundings well lighted. Lighting can reduce potential stumbling in the dark for residents and visitors. Keeping your lights on can also help deter crime if shrubbery or other cover near buildings is exposed, reducing places to hide.

Consider using long-lasting, energy-saving bulbs if your fixture can accept them.

Another option: maintenance staff can replace your outside light with a solid brass fixture with a photocell—so you can leave the switch turned on and your outside light will automatically come on when it gets dark and turn off during daylight hours.

Summary of Board Activities

September 25, 1991: Meeting of the Board of Directors

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. All Board members were present.

The Board approved the formation of a Civic Affairs Committee to inform and advise the Association on city-wide issues that affect Parkfairfax, such as the city trash rebate.

The Board discussed the specifications proposed by the Planning Board that would permit the installation of replacement casement windows. Currently, only double-hung neo-colonial sash windows are permitted. The motion to approve the proposed specifications failed to pass – Directors Culhane, Makens, Rerecich, and Walz voted against the motion; President Preston abstained. President Preston stated that the issue would be discussed again at the October 9 Board meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:43 p.m.

October 9, 1991: Meeting of the Board of Directors

The meeting was called to order at 7:38 p.m. Directors Rerecich and Walz were absent.

At Resident Forum a unit owner

stated that children and young adults have been harming the landscape around some buildings by running and riding bicycles through and over bushes and other plants. He also voiced his opposition to the proposed casement replacement window specifications. A second unit owner was concerned about the asbestos in her attic. Management will look into these issues and report to the unit owners and the Board.

The Board selected Merrill Lynch to act as the Association's investment counselor. Their proposed investment strategy for Parkfairfax is to invest in short-term U.S. Treasury bills. This is a very conservative approach as required by the Association's bylaws.

A Board committee comprised of Directors Makens and Zobeck was established to act as an information clearinghouse on the proposed specifications permitting casement replacement windows. The committee will gather information from unit owners, architects, vendors, and other interested parties for presentation to the Board. A decision on this issue is expected by the end of November.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:15 p.m. ■

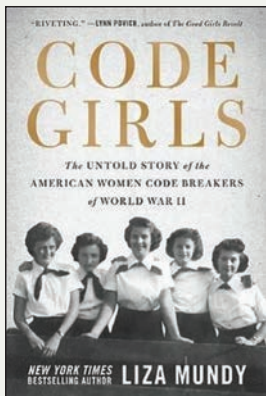
